SUMMARY & BACKGROUND

On March 11, 2021, the President signed into law the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 (ARP). ARP makes available \$122.8 billion nationally in a third round of Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) funds. New York State has been allocated nearly \$9 billion under the ARP Act's Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) Fund. The ARP Act requires that a minimum of \$8.09 billion (90 percent) be allocated to LEAs, including charter schools and Special Act School Districts that are LEAs. Pursuant to the terms of the ARP Act, LEA allocations have been calculated using the relative shares of grants awarded under Title I, Part A of the ESEA for the most recent federal fiscal year (2020). Each eligible LEA's ARP-ESSER allocation may be found HERE.

Under section 2001(d)(2) of ARP Act of 2021, each State Educational Agency (SEA) must make ARP-ESSER allocations to LEAs in an expedited and timely manner and, to the extent practicable, not later than 60 days after the SEA receives its ARP-ESSER funds. The first portion of ARP-ESSER Funds was awarded to states on March 24, 2021, and 60 days from that day is May 24, 2021. The U.S. Department of Education (USDE) has taken the position that an SEA makes allocations when it authorizes the LEA to begin to obligate funds in accordance with its needs. To enable New York State's LEAs to begin to obligate ARP-ESSER funds by USDE's May 24, 2021 deadline, the application for LEA 90% base ARP-ESSER allocations is being administered by NYSED as a two-part application process:

ARP-ESSER Application – Part 1: The first step was for each LEA to submit signed assurances to NYSED by May 24, 2021. Upon receipt of signed LEA assurances, NYSED provided an email notice to the LEA of substantially approvable application status. Upon receipt of such notice, LEAs were able to begin obligating their allocation of 90% base ARP-ESSER funds.

ARP-ESSER Application – Part 2: The second step will be the submission of a full application and budget by the LEA. NYSED will issue a Grant Award Notice (GAN) to the LEA after the LEA's application is fully reviewed and approved by NYSED. Part 2 will address several of the plan-related assurances an LEA must provide in Part 1 of the application process.

The ARP Act requires LEAs to reserve at least 20% of their 90% ARP-ESSER allocation to address learning loss through the implementation of evidence-based interventions, such as summer learning or summer enrichment, extended day, comprehensive afterschool programs, or extended school year programs, and ensure that such interventions respond to students' academic, social, and emotional needs and address the disproportionate impact of the coronavirus on economically disadvantaged students, children with disabilities, English learners, racial and ethnic minorities, migrant students, students experiencing homelessness, and children and youth in foster care. The district engaged stakeholders by sending out a survey asking stakeholders for input on how to spend the recovery funds. 191 stakeholders responded to the survey, 2.6% students, 80.6% parents, 18.8% community members, 3.7% professional support staff, 6.3% other district employees, .5% board member, and 3.7% representing a person with a disability (members could check multiple stakeholder groups). 74% of respondents prioritized student social/emotional/mental health and 68% of respondents prioritized adding staff to support academic learning loss. The district has added staff to support the social/emotional learning and developed district wide systems that include, daily check in of all students and community circles.

Administrators held staff meetings and employees gave input on how to spend the funds. The district will continue to meet and solicit input from stakeholders in regards to spending the COVID relief funds and how to implement the programming. This will be accomplished through surveys, board of education meetings, Principals advisory meetings, and faculty meetings.

Currently the district is involved in strategic planning, the strategic planning committee (all stakeholder groups are represented) will be consulted on an ongoing basis over the next five years.

The funds will be used to safely reopen schools, to ensure social distancing guidelines are met, preventive practices are in place that include sanitizing, masking, etc. The district Superintendent meets regularly with local health department officials and the reopening plan follows CDC guidance. Supplies such as masks, sanitizing solutions, gloves will be purchased. All school buses will be equipped with filtration systems to litigate the spread of COVID.

The data the district will use includes: student attendance, referrals, local grading, social emotional check-ins to include a daily questionairre, student failures from previous year & current school year, local assessments, benchmark assessments, progress monitoring assessments. Benchmark testing takes place 3x per year, to measure individual student growth. Progress monitoring will be used to check if inteventions, and extra instructional sessions are successful. This will allow for students to work on focused skills prior to moving onto the next skill in academic intervention sessions.

The district plans to implement comprehensive afterschool programs for credit recovery, tutoring and enrichment for students, the district offered summer programing for grades K-12 in 2021 and will continue with summer interventions and enrichment going forward. Students failing one or more classes at the middle/high school level will be identified for an after hours COVID Support program as described below:

The district has designed a support model to address student regression caused by COVID. This program will be funded utilizing ARP and 21 st century funds. Academic support sessions will target core academic subject areas and some required graduation courses. Those subject areas include: ELA, Mathematics, Social Studies, Science, and Spanish.

Students involved in this program will be identified using the following criteria:

â In grades 6-8

â Failing one or more of the identified subjects/courses

â Completes homework minimum 50% of the time

â Could also qualify if have a grade discrepancy outside of student norm (90's student w/70's)

The district will provide needed teacher professional development in intervention strategies and on going best practices. The district will find coaches to further advance on going best practices. The district will fund enrichment programs including but not limited to STEAM opportunities. The district will purchase curriculum materials focused on remediation and enrichment in reading and math. The district will create learning spaces that offer student choice and enhance engagement to deter from further learning loss.

7. The district has established a Multi Tiered system of supports that include a Positive Based Intervention Strategies team, building school improvement teams, grade level teams, Academic Intervention Support teams that will be studying district data to ensure all students, including but not limited to low-income families, students of color, English learners, children with disabilities, students experiencing homelessness, and children in foster care, needs are being met. These needs include academic and social emotional. Daily SEL check-ins are being implemented grades UPK-12 to ensure students emotionally unstable will get needed supports, daily community circles are a second emotional connection piece for students and staff. Staff is being trained in recognizing the signs of students in need of help and best practices on addressing the needs. Students will have a voice throughout the process as the year progresses and will take part in the decision making on how to meet their needs. Grades 6-12 have a mid day opportunity during the seminar period which will address social/emotional learning, social, and political issues. Additional staff has been added to include: two social work interns, one couseling intern and a half time school psychologist to enhance the counseling staff already present in the district. Interns are not funded utilizing ARP/ESSER funds.
